



The White Plumes attempted to introduce Hemp as a restorative agricultural product on their Pine Ridge Indian Reservation. Hemp does not damage the delicate plains eco-system and is also a crop that is being used more and more for everything from fuel to moisturizer.

One day before the harvest of their first crop, the federal government of **the United States of America swooped down on the reservation with armored assault vehicles, helicopters and armed DEA agents** in order to burn and destroy the crop. As a result of the White Plumes' repeated attempts to exercise Native American sovereignty, they now face substantial prison time from federal criminal indictment.

This compelling documentary chronicles the story of a Native American family as they assert their sovereignty through the growing of industrial hemp, in order to create economic independence.

**The film, Standing Silent Nation, is a documentary that records this struggle.**
